Introduction:

As part of the requirements for teams participating in the upcoming English Language Olympia, English language proficiency will be evaluated on the second and third days of the ELO event at designated judging rooms. Judges will listen to participants to evaluate their language skills while presenting their work.

Conditions & Limitations:

Competing teams should consider the following:

Criteria	Description					
Language	English should be the main language used in presenting the work conducted.					
Participation	It is important for all team members to equally participate in achieving the goals of ELO topics; each team member should have a significant role when presenting their work.					
Attendance	Students	All team members have to attend, as absence will result in a lower score.

Score Breakdown: English Language Proficiency

45 points of each ELO topic			
Interactive communication and oral production			
Grammar and vocabulary			
Pronunciation			

Competing teams have to pay attention to the following areas while working together:

1- Interactive communication and oral production:

The student communicates effectively with his / her partner, asking and answering simple questions, and where necessary initiating conversation and responding. The student uses appropriate strategies to complete the task successfully.

2- Grammar and vocabulary:

The student uses a sufficient range of vocabulary and structure to communicate clearly. Minor occasional errors do not impede communication.

3- Pronunciation:

The student's intonation, stress, and articulation of sounds make the message clear and comprehensible.
